

GENESIS & EVOLUTION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF RAJASTHAN

On the 8th of January 1947, the University of Rajputana appeared as a nascent star on the educational horizon of pre-independent India. The efforts for a separate University for the Rajputana State were initiated as early as 1921 when the Act for the Allahabad University was passed. The Act prescribed for separation of Intermediate classes from the Degree classes as a condition for affiliation, which meant more expenditure for the then colleges at Jaipur, Jodhpur and Ajmer, the only colleges then imparting University education and affiliated to Allahabad University. The location of the University became a controversial issue. The question was considered in all its aspects at a meeting called by the Agent to the Governor General in Rajputana and attended by the ruling Princes and Chiefs at Mt. Abu on 20 June 1924.


After a gap of nearly two decades, the efforts were again initiated in 1942 by Sir Mirza Ismail, the then Prime Minister of Jaipur, who appointed J.C. Rollo as Special Education Officer for this purpose. Sir Mirza Ismail and his successor in office Sir V.T. Krishnamachari took the initiative of holding talks with the representatives of Udaipur, Jodhpur, Bikaner, Alwar, and Jaipur in December 1946. They agreed to the establishment of a University at Jaipur and on January 8, 1947, legislation was promulgated and the colleges in the State formally federated into the University of Raiputana, which came into existence in July the same year.

Dr. G. S. Mahajani, Principal of Ferguson College, Poona (now Pune), was appointed the first Vice-Chancellor of the University and was an ideal person in many respects. He was a member of the Servants of India Society and was elected as a fellow of prominent institutions such as the National Academy of Sciences, India, and the Cambridge Philosophical Society at St John's College, Cambridge. The University was allocated an annual grant of Rs.2.5 lacs by the participating States of Rajputana. The remarkable thing is that the States made it clear that the "acceptance of the grant will in no way detract from the autonomy of the University and its freedom to organise its teaching and administration as to embody in them the highest conception of University life." Shri C. Rajagopalachari, the first Governor General of free India, had a very clear idea of the importance of the universities and their dignity. Addressing the students of Loyola College, Madras in August 1948, he advocated, "We have to maintain the highest standards for our universities. The pressure of democracy may be allowed to bear on anything else, but not on the standard of education."

The foundation stone of the University Campus was laid by Shri C. Rajagopalachari on February 20, 1949. He concluded his address with the words: "Nothing can be achieved unless we learn to be good and correct and self-disciplined and cultivate self-restraint and that, which is called dharma in our beautiful language."

The jurisdiction of this University at that time extended over the entire Rajputana State with the exception of Ajmer-Merwara. In the beginning, it was only an affiliating University with twenty-two colleges in different parts of the state. The University of Rajasthan has acquired the status of University with Potential for Excellence. Over the years, the University has redefined itself by meeting the challenges of changing trends in the educational system and has made a significant contribution to the field of higher education.

IMPLEMENTATION OF NEP IN UNIVERSITY OF RAJASTHAN

In the academic session 2023-24, the University adopted the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) for all UG programmes, promoting flexibility and interdisciplinary learning. A new curriculum framework has been introduced (https://www.uniraj.ac.in/circular/notice/28164-27.06.2023.pdf) which includes major and minor courses from different faculties, Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), and Value-Added Courses (VAC), designed to broaden the academic scope and develop critical skills. (https://uniraj.ac.in/index.php?mid=3103), Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) already exists in PG programmes. The introduction of diverse programs across faculties, including specialized ones in Fashion Design and Communication Design, highlight the commitment of the university to multidisciplinary education, preparing students for a complex world.

To integrate Humanities and Sciences, the university offers interdisciplinary courses. For instance, a student of B.A. can choose Major from both Social Science and Science faculties, and a B.Sc. student can select courses from the Social Science faculty. Engineering and Technology programs now include Humanities, Environmental Studies, and Social Sciences. The Faculty of Law also integrates CBCS and a semester system to include interdisciplinary elements in legal education. The compulsory environmental science course for undergraduates, focusing on sustainability and practical environmental practices till 2023 has been shifted to Value added Course under NEP-2020 in the academic session 2023-24.

Flexibility in the curriculum is emphasized with options for major and minor stream courses and additional credits through value-added courses like Aanandam, Environmental Studies, NCC, NSS, and Indian Value Systems. Community engagement is promoted through courses like Aanandam, involving group projects and experiential learning. Multidisciplinary courses such as Computer Basics & Office Management Tools and Textile Studies are also offered to the students.

The NEP-2020 framework introduces a flexible curriculum with multiple entry and exit points. Students can exit after the first, second, or third year with a UG Certificate or Diploma, and re-enter to complete their degree within seven years. A four-

year program offers a UG Degree (Honours) or an Honours Degree with Research for those interested in research is also in place.

- Academic Bank of Credits (ABC): The University of Rajasthan has actively embraced the Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) initiative, integral to NEP 2020, by aligning with the National Credit Framework (NCrF). It has registered 467,062 ABCIDs for students and uploaded 78,979 marksheets to the digital repository. Undergraduate results from the 2023 first semester across the Faculties of Arts, Commerce, Social Science, and Science are now part of the ABC platform, showcasing the university's commitment to flexible and accessible education pathways.
- The University is registered with Digi Locker NAD (ID-NAD016490) for ABC, which allows student credentials to be uploaded in a prescribed format, ensuring secure and convenient access to academic records. This integration supports the flexibility of multiple entries and exits during the chosen program, enhancing accessibility and reducing bureaucratic hurdles.
- Digi Locker integration simplifies verification processes for employers and educational institutions, promoting the authenticity of credentials. It enhances transparency, efficiency, and security in managing academic records while minimizing fraud and document forgery. Additionally, it aligns with digital transformation trends by supporting a paperless, eco-friendly approach to education.
- The University of Rajasthan bridges the gap between industry and academia by incorporating both theoretical and practical elements into its curriculum. This integration emphasizes both global and domestic professional development.
- The University fosters international collaboration through strategic partnerships, such as MOU with Jean Moulin University, Lyon 3, France, first signed in 2013 and thereafter renewed on regular basis; Aix Marseilles University, France, La Sapienza, Rome. The MOUs with French University have enabled MA French students from the Department of European Languages, Literature and Culture Studies to participate in the International Student Exchange Programme, and pursuing studies for one/two semester at Jean Moulin and Aix Marseilles University. These efforts advance the internationalization of education and facilitate credit transfer. The University is also gearing towards joint degree programmes. The rules for the same have been passed in the Academic Council held in August 2024.

Faculty members at the University of Rajasthan are encouraged to design their curricular and pedagogical approaches within an approved framework. Course-related committees work together to create, modify, and propose syllabuses, which are then approved by the respective Boards of Studies. Faculty members encourage a student-centred approach, prioritizing active engagement and participation over passive learning.

Additionally, workshops, lectures are organized on creating awareness about NEP-2020, Digi Locker and ABC. A one-day workshop was organized under the joint aegis of UGC-MMTTC, IQAC, UoR and Higher Education Department, Government of Rajasthan, and in collaboration with National e-Governance Division, MEITY, Government of India on 1st July 2024. This workshop was aimed to boost awareness and facilitate the implementation of the ABC system in state-funded universities.

The University of Rajasthan emphasizes skill development and practical experience through a robust vocational education framework, in alignment with the National Skills Qualifications Framework (NSQF) and NEP 2020. Students are required to earn 10 credits from skill enhancement courses such as computer programming, cybersecurity, data science, financial literacy, and event management, reflecting the university's focus on job readiness. The curriculum offers flexibility with options for single and double major, along with multiple entry and exit points, allowing students to change their major after the second semester.

Vocational courses are integrated into mainstream education, enhancing employability through partnerships with organizations like RCAT and the Dola Foundation, offering skill enhancement programs. Activities such as campus clean-ups, field trips, and internships with organizations like RBI and CSIR are integrated to combine practical learning with environmental awareness.

The academic structure is divided into two semesters per year, with an additional eight-week summer term dedicated to internships, apprenticeships, and work-based training, particularly for students aiming to exit after two or four semesters.

The curriculum includes a Value-Added course (2 credits), like Aanandam, NCC, NSS, the Indian Value System, and Nutrition for Health & Fitness, focusing on holistic student development. Aanandam is a unique credit course teaching the values of

compassion, dharma, ahimsa, brotherhood, Joy of Giving. All the students have to enrol for this course and maintain a diary. From the current session, a course on Electoral Literacy has been introduced which aims to teach constitutional values and rights of citizens.

- To ensure that all students take at least one vocational course before graduating, the university has designed a credit structure where students must earn 150 credits to graduate, including 4 credits from vocational courses or internships, 10 credits from skill enhancement courses, 8 credits from value-added courses and 12 credits from multidisciplinary courses.
- The University actively engages industry veterans and master craftsmen to bridge gaps in vocational training, establishing partnerships with industry leaders, government, and NGOs through MoUs https://www.uniraj.ac.in/index.php? mid=113. These collaborations offer training, internships, and employability enhancement opportunities.
- The University's commitment to skill development is further demonstrated through the Incubation Centre, Placement Cell, Career Counselling Cell, and Centre for Entrepreneurship and Skill Development https://esd.uniraj.ac.in/. These entities work together to enhance employability, align with NEP 2020, and address local, regional, national, and global needs.
- The curriculum also incorporates state-specific content, such as Rajasthan's history, languages, and culture, while integrating major national initiatives like Skill India, Make in India, Digital India, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, and Unnat Bharat Abhiyan.

These efforts ensure that the University of Rajasthan remains at the forefront of vocational education and skill development, preparing students for the demands of the modern workforce and contributing to national development.

OUTCOME BASED EDUCATION (OBE):

The University of Rajasthan has adapted its curriculum to align with Outcome-Based Education (OBE) to meet the evolving needs of higher education. Undergraduate (UG) and Postgraduate (PG) syllabuses are meticulously designed to focus on learning outcomes, ensuring alignment with market, industry, and governmental standards. The University of Rajasthan captures Outcome-Based Education (OBE) in teaching and

learning practices through a structured approach that aligns educational practices with predefined outcomes.

The University's approach to OBE aims to enhance both professional development and global readiness by bridging the gap between theoretical knowledge and practical skills. The curriculum includes discipline-specific, Ability Enhancement, Skill Enhancement, and value-added courses, all designed with clear Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs), and Course Outcomes (COs). The courses foster a learner-oriented approach, supporting lifelong learning and employability, and integrate feedback from stakeholders to align with national initiatives like Skill India and Digital India.

The syllabus of each programme, including course content and outcomes, is approved by respective Boards of Studies and made available on the university website for transparency. A range of assessment methods, including exams, quizzes, projects, presentations, laboratory work, and internships, are employed to measure the achievement of POs, PSOs, and COs.

Comprehensive evaluation mechanisms are in place, including continuous assessment strategies, such as mid-term exams, projects, seminars, and assignments, which are used to track student progress throughout the semester. Clear evaluation criteria ensure students acquire comprehensive subject knowledge, critical thinking skills, and professional readiness. End-of-semester exams include comprehensive written tests covering the entire syllabus, ensuring thorough evaluation of student understanding.

Faculty development is emphasized, with regular workshops, orientation programs, and refresher courses designed to enhance pedagogical skills and ensure effective content delivery. Curricula are regularly updated by each department's Board of Studies, based on stakeholder feedback and competitive exam requirements, ensuring relevance to industry and academic standards. The success of students in national examinations like NET and GATE demonstrates the effectiveness of these OBE-aligned teaching and learning practices.

The University of Rajasthan implements several good practices in Outcome-Based Education (OBE). Each semester begins with an orientation program for students, clearly outlining the expected outcomes of their courses, helping them understand their learning objectives. The detailed syllabus is available on the university website https://www.uniraj.ac.in/index.php?mid=3102. They include learning outcomes, recommended readings, course content, and lecture hours, ensuring transparency and clarity for students.

The curriculum has been designed to address local, regional, national, and global needs, aligning with the institution's commitment to adding value and addressing the knowledge economy.

Stringent admission criteria and support services are in place to attract and retain high-quality students, with postgraduate and doctoral admissions conducted via university entrance exams adhering to UGC guidelines.

The University's commitment to OBE through these practices enhances its reputation as a forward-thinking institution aligned with NEP 2020 principles.

- The University's Learning Management System (LMS) at https://lms.uniraj.edu.in/ is central to this effort, facilitating effective teaching and learning by incorporating lecture capture systems and course management tools. The LMS allows students to engage in vocational and modular courses with flexibility, making it easier for them to balance their studies with other commitments. Faculty are encouraged to create e-content with support from inhouse facilities, enabling the development of lecture videos and other digital materials.
- ICT platforms are being leveraged to enrich teaching and learning experiences, supporting comprehensive remote learning through an upgraded digital library infrastructure. The library offers remote access to a wealth of e-resources, including online databases, e-journals, and digital repositories, which are essential for research and academic success.

- Platforms like e-Shodh Sindhu (eSS) and the Dr. B R Ambedkar Library https://www.uniraj.ac.in/CentralLib/index.html provide expanded access to these e-resources, supporting a wide range of academic and vocational programs.
- The university's library is equipped with automated OPAC Library Management Software and offers extensive e-resources, including e-books and e-journals, accessible through an IP-based network. https://www.uniraj.ac.in/ CentralLib/index.html
- The University has approved credit accumulation from Swayam, MOOCs and DOCC programs, broadening the educational opportunities of its students and enhancing their global competence. Undergraduate programs allow students to earn up to 40% of credits through online courses approved by the institution, supporting multiple entries and exits as per UGC regulations.
- Faculty members benefit from resources such as SWAYAM and e-PG Pathshala, which provide high-quality, curriculum-based e-content across various postgraduate disciplines. They are also being encouraged to offer courses on these platforms.
- The university is committed to multidisciplinary research through a comprehensive policy that emphasizes the convergence of various fields. NEP 2020 alignment includes Apprenticeship-Enabled Degree Programs (AEDP), offering practical industry experience. Collaboration with external institutions and platforms like RUBIC, Design and Innovation Cluster (DIC), and E-YUVA supports innovation and entrepreneurship.

FINANCE AT A GLANCE

A. Institutional Funds & Optimal Utilization of Resources (Other than salary and fees)

The University of Rajasthan implements a well-structured strategy for mobilizing funds, ensuring optimal utilization of resources to support academic, research, and infrastructural needs. This approach is anchored in diversified funding avenues, financial planning, and effective management of resources.

Regular Source of Income: Primary sources of revenue generation for The University include:

- Examination and Course Fees: Substantial income is generated through examination fees and course fees for degree, diploma, and certificate courses and self-financing courses.
- Affiliation Fees from Colleges: Fees from affiliated colleges contribute to the University's financial base.
- Income from Certificates and Revaluation: Income is also derived from issuing migration and provisional certificates, and from the revaluation of answer books.
- Hostel and Non-Teaching Departments: Revenues are generated from hostel services and various non-teaching departments.
- Miscellaneous Receipts: Additional funds come from garden income, sale of forms, recovery and various other sources.
- Government Grants: The University receives substantial grants from the State Government, along with specific funding from the central government agencies.

Financial Management and Resource Utilization

The financial management system is designed to ensure the efficient and transparent utilization of funds. The Finance Committee, led by the Vice-Chancellor, plays a crucial role in examining budget estimates, reviewing accounts, and advising on financial matters. The University follows a rigorous budgeting process, where a committee of senior faculty prepares budget estimates based on departmental needs. The Finance Committee scrutinizes these estimates, ensuring they align with the University's strategic objectives.

University of Rajasthan adheres to a detailed accounts manual that outlines rules for expenditure, ensuring transparency and efficiency. Funds are allocated to various heads, including salaries, examination expenses, maintenance, and research grants, all monitored through a centralized system to prevent overspending.

Through a strategic approach to fund mobilization and resource management, UoR continues to support its mission of academic excellence, research innovation, and infrastructural development.

The institution regularly conducts Internal and External Financial Audits

The University of Rajasthan has a robust financial auditing system in place to ensure transparency, accountability, and compliance with financial regulations. The university conducts both internal and external audits to maintain accurate financial records and ensure proper utilization of resources across its operations.

The budget of the University is prepared in accordance with the provisions outlined in Volume 3, Chapter 48, Ordinance 385 and 385A, with audits conducted under various heads, including the maintenance budget, income and expenditure of constituent colleges, specific activities, and accounts related to sponsored projects sanctioned by funding agencies like UGC, MHRD, SAP, DST, and ICSSR.

The internal audit system at the university is overseen by an Audit Cell, comprised of permanently deputed accounts service employees from the Government of Rajasthan. This cell ensures that the financial processes across constituent colleges and departments comply with regulatory guidelines and that any discrepancies are promptly addressed. A separate cell also ensures compliance with audit reports from the Accountant General (AG) and the Local Fund Audit Department (LFAD).

Several types of Audits are conducted at the University of Rajasthan to ensure that financial transactions are transparent and properly documented:

- **1. CA Audit**: A team of chartered accountants is hired to conduct internal audits, prepare annual accounts, and file GST and income tax returns.
- 2. Internal Audit: A team of auditors deputed by the state government under the supervision of the university's Financial Advisor conducts audits of all university units. This team reviews all financial transactions to ensure compliance and accuracy.
- **3. AG Audit**: The audit team from the Accountant General's office visits the university annually to audit its financial accounts and other related matters.
- **4. LFAD Audit**: The Local Fund Audit Department, Government of Rajasthan, conducts an annual audit of the financial accounts of the university's colleges and departments.

Additionally, the university has a strong external audit mechanism. Each payment is subject to pre-audit by a resident government auditor, ensuring that no payment is processed without prior verification. The utilization certificates for grants received from various funding

agencies are certified by an authorized audit officer. Any objections raised during the audit are addressed before payments are finalized, ensuring timely resolution of financial discrepancies.

To resolve audit objections, the university has a mechanism in place where the concerned units provide the necessary documents and explanations to settle any discrepancies. Regular communication between the departments and the audit teams ensures that audit reports are promptly addressed and any issues are rectified in compliance with regulations.

Overall, the University of Rajasthan's audit process involves multiple layers of checks and balances, including internal audits by government-deputed auditors, external audits by AG and LFAD teams, and pre-audit processes to ensure transparency. This comprehensive auditing system ensures that all financial transactions are thoroughly reviewed, compliant with regulations, and properly documented, fostering financial accountability and integrity within the university.

Eco-Friendly Landscapes: The University has taken steps to design its landscapes in an environmentally conscious manner. Lawns, green spaces, and gardens are strategically located to reduce heat and energy consumption while enhancing the natural beauty of the campus. Drought-resistant plants have been chosen to minimize water usage.

Sustainable Energy Consumption:

a. Solar Energy: The importance of energy efficiency and conservation in the University was realized, so a MOU was signed under the Smart City Project to install solar power panels at 7 different locations. A total of 950 KW of electricity is being produced.

- c. Solar Water Heater: One hundred solar water heaters installed in the boys' and girls' hostels are being efficiently maintained every year. Installation of solar water heaters has proved to be an efficient way to meet the everyday requirements of the students without incurring any fuel costs.
- **d. Green Building Practices:** Several new constructions and renovations within the University are designed with eco-friendly practices in mind. To support its operations, the nursery is equipped with essential infrastructure designed to ensure smooth functioning and efficient management. The facility relies on two borewells, two water tanks, and a well to maintain adequate irrigation. This robust water management system is crucial for sustaining the health and vitality of the extensive plant collection. The nursery also

includes three office rooms and two storage rooms. A guard room is also strategically placed on the premises, providing round-the-clock surveillance and protection.

The nursery is not only a centre of horticultural excellence but also an economically significant enterprise. Its annual income ranges from 2 to 5 lakh rupees, reflecting its role as a major player in the local plant market. By offering a wide array of plants at competitive prices, the nursery maintains an extensive and cost-effective inventory, making it an attractive destination for plant buyers and enthusiasts.

One of the highlights of the nursery's annual calendar is its prestigious chrysanthemum exhibition. This highly anticipated event, held once a year, garners considerable attention from the community and beyond. It is graced by distinguished guests, including the Governor, Ministers, and the Vice Chancellor, who often serve as the chief guest. The exhibition showcases the nursery's commitment to horticultural excellence and its role in promoting plant cultivation and appreciation within the campus, enhancing its reputation as a hub of botanical innovation and community engagement.

C. ANANDAM PROGRAMME

The "Anandam" program was introduced in the University of Rajasthan as a compulsory subject in the curriculum of all UG/PG degree courses of annual and semester scheme from academic session 2020-21 onwards. National Education Policy emphasized Aanandam program to sensitize the students towards challenges and issues prevalent today in society and to instill the joy of giving in young people turning them into responsible citizens who shall build a meaningful future for a better nation. Now this year for the undergraduate prorammes, Anandam is converted as value added courses (30 hourse in a session) with 2 credits. This has been implemented in all the Constituent and affliated colleges of the University. And for Post Graduate courses Anandam Programmes is been a part of the time table with 30 minutes/day slot each day. During the year/semester, students are required to engage in individual and group community service activities by recording daily one act of goodness and undertaking community service projects as a group activity. For group activity, the students are required to take up projects outside College/University hours with NGOs /Govt. / social service organisations. Individual and group activities are to be suggested/approved and monitored by mentors allotted by their college/department. The active participation of students in celebrating 'Aanandam Day' is through motivational lectures/movies/ webinars/interactive sessions may be organised. Guidelines for the implementation of this unique compulsory subject 'Aanandam' and the details of the evaluation of projects, marking scheme, etc. are available on the University website.

Some Group of Activities Conducted Under the Aanandam Programme

Adopting an area, colony, to organize and monitor water and power-saving campaigns to teach people the value of natural resources through slogans, posters, and awareness drives. Additionally, focusing on plastic and organic waste disposal by training communities can promote eco-friendly practices. Groups to support drug and alcohol de-addiction and motivate individuals toward sobriety can address social issues. Vocational skill training programs

in juvenile jails and women's homes empower individuals with life skills, while helping workers and housemaids form cooperatives for small-scale loans can improve their financial independence. Efforts to monitor and resolve harassment of women, children, and the elderly are vital for safety and security. Promoting local art forms, such as weaving, dyeing, folk songs, and old manuscripts, helps preserve cultural heritage.

Community-based yoga or meditation groups specific to age and gender fostered collective well-being, while initiatives to restore wells, step wells, ponds, or similar water sources contribute to water conservation. E-literacy programs helped individuals become proficient in using emails, websites, and other digital. Organized various sports activities like yoga, meditation, drills, and physical exercises to promote a healthy lifestyle.

UNIVERSITY INNOVATION CLUSTER IN BIO-TECHNOLOGY (UIC-B) E- YUVA

The E-YUVA (Encouraging Youth for Undertaking Value-Added Innovative Translational Research) Scheme, funded by the Biotechnology Industrial Research Assistance Council (BIRAC), aims to foster a culture of applied research and need-oriented (societal or industry) entrepreneurial innovation among young students and researchers. The scheme is implemented through the E-YUVA Centre (EYC) at the University of Rajasthan, which promotes an entrepreneurial culture through fellowship, annual research grants, pre-incubation support, and mentoring. EYC, located within the University campus and mentored by the BIRAC Bio NEST supported TIDES Business Incubator of IIT Roorkee, provides support for students under two categories.

DESIGN INNOVATION CENTRE

Under the national initiative for setting up Design Innovation Centre, approved by the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India, the Design Innovation Centre (DIC) has been established at the Centre for Converging Technologies, University of Rajasthan, Jaipur. The DIC includes three spokes: Birla Institute of Scientific Research, Jaipur; RK Patni Govt. College, Kishangarh; and Lachoo Memorial College of Science and Technology, Jodhpur. This project aims to enhance participation, interaction, and cooperation between academia and industry for design innovation, with a focus on converging technologies. It seeks to develop a dynamic curriculum for process, product, and system design, aligned with industry needs and societal requirements.

The DIC's major objectives are to promote design education, foster a Design Culture and Design Thinking, and encourage student innovation. It integrates various resources to build a platform for university-industry partnerships, creating a design innovation network that nurtures pioneering ideas and translates them into commercially viable projects. Training programs offered by the DIC include Food Design, Computer Aided Drug Design (CADD) in association with Birla Scientific Industrial Research (BISR), Inclusive Development in Materials Science, Clinical Medical Informatics in association with SMS Medical College and BISR, Instrumentation Techniques in Science and Technology, Intellectual Property Rights/Patents, etc.

USIC: UNIVERSITY SCIENCE INSTRUMENTATION CENTRE

The University Science Instrumentation Centre (USIC) at the University of Rajasthan, established in the late 1970s with initial support from the University Grants Commission (UGC), plays a crucial role in academic and industrial research by providing advanced instrumentation facilities. The Centre's primary objectives are to house high-end research instruments and offer specialized instrumentation services for spectral, thermal, chemical, and micro structural analysis. It supports internal and external researchers, including faculty, scholars, and students, with critical tools for scientific research.

The USIC is equipped with sophisticated instruments such as SQUID, SEM, TEM, GC Mass spectrometer, LC Mass spectrometer, and FTIR spectrometer. These instruments cater to the needs of University Science departments and other institutions for research in areas like cancer research, virology, nanotechnology, and biotechnology. They are also available for future use by industry.

The Centre is dedicated to enhancing the quality of scientific publications and promoting experimental research. Its thrust areas include nonmaterial characterization and the magnetization of Nano and bulk materials. USIC's infrastructure features major research facilities.

Vision

Scientific instruments may be usefully regarded as the capital goods of scientific research. That is to say, the conduct of scientific research generally requires some antecedent investment in specific equipment to enhance the ability to observe and measure specific categories of natural phenomena. In due course of time, UOR-USIC may play its role in enhancing quality publications and also encourage more people to go for experimental research for practical applications.

CENTRE FOR NON-CONVENTIONAL ENERGY RESOURCES

A reliable supply of energy is a key issue of this century. With the aim to achieve this need of human life, the Centre for Non-Conventional Energy Resources (CNCER) was established in the year 2000. The aim of the Centre is to work for Green energy/power. This Centre is mainly established for the purpose of research in the field of renewable energy and material science. This course deals with the issues of alternative energy sources and sustainable development such as Thin films (surface & Interfaces), Solar Cells, Hydrogen Storage (Content measurements & kinematics), Nanostructure & Nano materials synthesis & their characterization for various applications. During the course, the research students are learning and measuring (hands-on practice) the data through live experiments at the Centre or National/International Collaborative Institutions. The experiments included in the laboratories are based on the theoretical course structure and the research students are allowed to enrich their subject knowledge by independently exploring these experiments for various applications under the supervision of teachers. The thrust areas include Hydrogen Energy: Storage and Applications, Solar Energy: Materials and Devices, Thin Films: Surfaces and Interfaces, and Amorphous Semiconductors.

INDIRA GANDHI CENTRE FOR HUMAN ECOLOGY, ENVIRONMENTAL AND POPULATION STUDIES

The Indira Gandhi Centre for Human Ecology, Environmental and Population Studies was established in the year 1984. The Indira Gandhi Centre was granted the status of a Department of the University of Rajasthan, Jaipur in 1997. The Department, under the COSIST programme with financial and other support from the UGC, has introduced a two-year Master's degree course (M.Sc.) in Environmental Science since July 1997. One-year P.G. Diploma courses in Human Ecology, Environmental Studies and Population Studies were introduced in 1984-85. FACULTY TRAINING CENTRE

UGC-MMTTC Centre

The UGC-Malviya Mission Teachers Training Centre (formerly called the Human Resource Development Centre) at the University of Rajasthan, Jaipur, was established on May 11, 1988, under UGC's scheme for Academic Staff Colleges (ASCs) in response to the National Policy on Education (NPE), 1983. Ranked as the second-best among 33 HRDCS in India in 2012 by the NAAC peer review committee, the Centre conducts Faculty Induction and Orientation Programmes for new teachers, Refresher Courses for in-service teachers, Short Term Courses, and Summer/Winter Schools/Webinars on multidisciplinary themes. It also offers special programmes such as Academic Administrators' Workshops, Principals' Meets, and training for Non-Teaching Staff. Monthly, it conducts 2 NEP orientation and sensitization programmes, training faculty members on the New Education Policy 2020; 937 faculty members were trained in three months. Since its inception, the HRDC has organized 379 Refresher Courses, 113 Orientation Programmes, 28 Short Term Courses, 03 Workshops, 3 Summer Schools, 2 Winter Schools, and 03 Webinars. Special events include a Principal's Meet, an Academic Administrator's Workshop, and an Interaction Programme for Ph.D. Scholars. The centre has completed 07 online Faculty Induction Programmes under the GURU-DAKSHATA scheme and 04 NEP Programmes, and organized 10 Faculty Induction Programmes under the RUSA scheme. Approximately 23,000 participants have benefited from these courses. The Centre is a national hub of academic activities, hosting resource persons from various fields across India. Participants come from across India, including remote areas like Pondicherry, Mizoram, Nagaland, Andaman and Nicobar Islands, and Sikkim. MMTTC features three well-equipped AC Seminar Halls, a state-of-the-art Computer Lab, a library with

5800 books and various periodicals, and a Guest House with 30 twin-bed rooms, modern facilities, and a common recreation room. Its philosophy emphasizes the holistic development of teachers, focusing on their role as agents of socio-economic change and national development, and encourages them to mentor students and promote ethical values.

- 8. Delay by the institution in the conduct of examinations, or declaration of results
- 9. Failure by the institution to provide student amenities as set out in the prospectus
- 10. Non-transparent or unfair practices adopted by the institution for the evaluation of students.
- 11. Delay in, or denial of, the refund of fees due to a student who withdraws admission within the time mentioned in the prospectus
- 12. Complaints of alleged discrimination of students from the Scheduled Castes, the Scheduled Tribes, Other Backward Classes, Women, Minorities, or persons with disabilities categories.
- 13. Denial of quality education as promised at the time of admission.

COLLEGE DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL (CDC)

The College Development Council (CDC) was established by the University in 1978 under the UGC scheme to ensure proper planning and development of its affiliated and constituent Colleges (Govt., Non-Govt., and Constituent), improve higher education standards, and enhance faculty quality. The CDC invites proposals from colleges under sections 2(f) and 12-B of the UGC Act, 1953, and recommends them to the UGC for approval. Currently, 108

Colleges affiliated with the University of Rajasthan, Jaipur are recognized by the UGC under section 2(f) & 12-B, and 33 Colleges under section 2(f). Among these, 04 Colleges have CPE status and 02 have Autonomous Status. UGC Schemes for College Teachers include Faculty Improvement Programmes, Major/Minor Research Projects, and UGC Schemes for Students such as Conferences/Workshops/Seminars, Travel Grants, and Day Care Centers. UGC provides financial assistance for various schemes, including Development for Colleges, Coaching for NET for SC/ST/OBC (non-creamy layer) & Minorities, construction/renovation of Academic buildings, purchase of Books & Journals, Equipment, Colleges with Potential for Excellence (CPE), Women Hostels, Golden Jubilee/Centenary grants, Additional Grants, Infrastructure Rejuvenation, 'Catch-up' grants, and support for Colleges in Rural/Remote/Border/Hill/Tribal Areas, and Backward Areas. The Coordinator, CDC assists Colleges with proposals and guidance, monitors UGC grant utilization, and recommends proposals to the UGC based on the guidelines on www.ugc.ac.in. The CDC plays a key role in improving infrastructure and benefiting faculty and students.

INTERNATIONAL COOPERATION CELL

International Cooperation Cell established in 2007, works to facilitate cooperation between the University of Rajasthan and International universities. It coordinates, negotiates and partners with International Universities to develop exchange programmes for faculty and students. From 2007 onwards, 31 mobilities of students and Faculty have taken place. Out of these,21 students and 08 faculty members have come from foreign Universities to the University of Rajasthan and 20 students and 02 Faculty members have gone from the University of Rajasthan to Paul Valery Montpellier-III, France; Jean Moulin Lyon-III, France; Aix Marseilles University, France, University of Montreal, Quebec, Canada, and Novosibirsk State Technical University, Russia. In the last academic year, four students of the ELLCS department pursued their one semester as exchange students at Jean Moulin Lyon 3, Lyon and Aix Marseilles University, France. MOUs with Universiti Teknologi MARA, Malaysia was signed in 2022.

It provides legal assistance to protect intellectual property from infringement and manages disputes related to IP rights.

INFONET CENTRE

The Infonet Centre at the University of Rajasthan is the technical backbone, managing the Campus Wide Area Network, Wi-Fi Network, website maintenance, mail servers, result servers, and research servers. It plays a crucial role in providing access to digital resources and advancing the university's technology infrastructure using open-source software and the Linux-Apache-MySQL/Perl/PHP (LAMP) platform. The Centre collaborates with the Campus Wide Area Network (CWAN), known as RUN (Rajasthan University Network), which uses Gigabit Ethernet Technology with Optical Fiber Backbone for high-speed connectivity across the campus, and the National Knowledge Network (NKN), which offers ultra-high-speed internet to institutions across India. The Centre ensures compliance with NKN policies to support advanced studies and research. Its goal is to enhance academic excellence and facilitate knowledge dissemination, aiming for seamless access to resources and enriched academic experiences. Best practices include in-house web application development and maintenance, continuous improvement of applications, and securing services with SSL and TLS encryption. The Centre's infrastructure features Blade Servers and SAN solutions for data management, modern networking with RUN and NKN, and facilities for academic functions like video conferencing.

University Web Servers

One of the core features of Infonet Centre's services is that all of its websites are SSL and TLS enabled. SSL stands for Secure Sockets Layer, while TLS stands for Transport Layer Security. Both protocols are used to encrypt data that is transmitted over the internet, providing an extra layer of security against hackers and other cyber threats. SSL and TLS are widely used across the internet, and they have become the de facto standard for securing web traffic. Infonet Centre's SSL and TLS-enabled websites ensure that all data transmitted between the user and the server is encrypted, providing a secure connection that is resistant to eavesdropping and tampering. Hostel & Wardens

A new building, named Dr. BR Ambedkar Library, has been constructed as an extension of the Rajasthan University Library with financial support from the UGC under the UPE grant. In addition to book lending, the library provides several services, including Reference Service, Reprographic Service, E-Journals online accessibility, Internet and Wi-Fi facilities, Research Reference Guidance Service, Braille Service for visually impaired persons, OPAC service, and RFID facility. The books are classified into various categories such as general books, textbooks, reference books, RUSA books, theses, and reports. The Rajasthan University Library's goal and vision include expanding services based on e-resources and Web-OPAC services. The library boasts a rich collection of old documents known as 'The Abu Collection', which includes Government reports, gazetteers, and other publications dating back to the early 19th Century, valuable for historians. The Abu Collection is now available in digitized format in the National Digital Library. The library also maintains a notable Micro-form Collection, featuring microfilms and microfiches.

The library operates every day of the year, except for the following holidays: 26th January (Republic Day), 15th August (Independence Day), Dhulandi, Dussehra, Govardhan Pooja (the day after Deepawali), and on special occasions by order of the Director.

Book Circulation through RFID

Book borrowing facility is available to all faculty, research scholars, students and University staff. RFID technology is used for book security and RFID Smart Cards are issued to Central Library members for automated circulation. Only general books will be issued, but reference books, rare books, theses & dissertations, loose/bound issues of periodicals and other reference materials are only for consultation within the Central Library. Borrowers must satisfy themselves about the physical condition of the books before borrowing otherwise, they will be held responsible for any damage or mutilation noticed later or at the time of returning. Circulation staff in the Central Library will also assist you in locating items in the stack area and related matters. The library has a rich collection of old documents including the collection of British residents at Mount Abu, which is popularly known as "The Abu collection'. This includes Government reports, gazetteers and other publications dating back to early 19th" Century. These are of research value for Historians, Economists and Sociologists.

Central Library offers Inter Library Loan Service for the documents that are not available in the Central Library collection. This service is provided to the entire University community to meet their academic and research needs.

B. ENGINEERING & WORKS DEPARTMENT

The engineering office plays a crucial role in maintaining University buildings.

The key responsibilities include:

• Inspection and Assessment:

Regular inspections of university buildings to assess the condition of structures, electrical systems, plumbing, HVAC, and other facilities. Identification of potential issues like wear and tear, structural damage, or system failures that require maintenance or repairs.

• Planning and Scheduling:

Development of maintenance schedules for routine and preventive maintenance. Prioritization of urgent repairs to ensure the safety and functionality of the buildings.

Budgeting and Cost Estimation:

Preparation of cost estimates for repairs and maintenance work.

• Coordination with Contractors:

Liaising with contractors and vendors for specialized services such as electrical, plumbing, or structural repairs. Ensuring compliance with government regulations, quality standards, and safety protocols.

Documentation and Reporting:

Maintaining detailed records of inspections, repairs, and maintenance activities. Preparing reports for senior management on building conditions, maintenance needs, and completed work.

• Emergency Response:

Quick response to emergencies like structural failures, leaks, or electrical hazards to prevent further damage or safety risks. The engineering office ensures university buildings are safe, functional, and well-maintained, supporting the overall infrastructure of public services.

UNIVERSITY PRESS

The University Press is a small unit registered under the Factory Act Established on 1962, November 1st. The press conducts various types of printing works allotted to it. The press possesses one mechanical composing unit, one offset printing machine, two automatic printing machines, three machines and one cylinder machine. Most of the work done in the Press is related either to the academic side or to the examination. For the Examination branch, it prints Application Forms, Examination Programmes, Marks-sheets, Roll Lists, Tabulation Registers, Headings and various other types of forms related to it. Printing of English versions of the degrees in all faculties is also done by the Press. The Press prints and supplies about 75 types of printed stationary items. These are stored in the Press and supplied to various departments and constituent colleges of the University during the whole year. These items include various types of Registers, Forms, Receipts Books, File Covers, and File Boards, etc. The Press also caters to the need for various forms required towards affiliation of colleges. It also executes the Printing of Journals of the University South Asia Study Centre, Mass Communication, Department of ABST, Business administration, EAFM, S.S.R.C. Economics, Magazines like Glimpses, Booklet of various conferences organized by the departments, Reference Books for the Centre for Mass Communication, etc. Successful efforts have been made during the past 53 years to increase the income of revenue and curtailment of expenditures. There has been no labour trouble and the employer-employee relationship has remained cordial throughout the period under report. The workers participated in all the cultural and welfare activities as well as in sports conducted by the

union or the administration from time to time. Student of Mass Communication and the Department of Home Science also visit the press for their paper and project. Looking to the growing demand for modern printing from all the departments, sections and constituted colleges of the University, the Press has ample scope for development and replacement of its existing old machinery. One Offset machine, one plate-making machine and two computers were installed from the fund received from the U.G.C in its X Plan and one paper-cutting machine was also installed in the Press. Now the year of 2016 press needs One Small Colourd Offset Machine, a Photo State cum Scanner Machine, One Computer 1-5, and one large printer for betterment of the Press.
