GENESIS & EVOLUTION: UNIVERSITY OF RAJASTHAN

On the 8th of January 1947, the University of Rajputana appeared as a nascent star on the educational horizon of pre-independent India. The efforts for a separate University for the Rajputana State were initiated as early as 1921 when the Act for the Allahabad University was passed. The Act prescribed for separation of Intermediate classes from the Degree classes as a condition for affiliation, which meant more expenditure for the then colleges at Jaipur, Jodhpur and Ajmer, the only colleges then imparting University education and affiliated to Allahabad University. The location of the University became a controversial issue. The question was considered in all its aspects at a meeting called by the Agent to the Governor General in Rajputana and attended by the ruling Princes and Chiefs at Mt. Abu on 20 June 1924.

After a gap of nearly two decades, the efforts were again initiated in 1942 by Sir Mirza Ismail, the then Prime Minister of Jaipur, who appointed J.C. Rollo as Special Education Officer for this purpose. Sir Mirza Ismail and his successor in office Sir V.T. Krishnamachari took the initiative of holding talks with the representatives of Udaipur, Jodhpur, Bikaner, Alwar, and Jaipur in December 1946. They agreed to the establishment of a University at Jaipur and on January 8, 1947, legislation was promulgated and the colleges in the State formally federated into the University of Rajputana, which came into existence in July the same year.

Dr. G. S. Mahajani, Principal of Ferguson College, Poona (now Pune), was appointed the first Vice-Chancellor of the University and was an ideal person in many respects. He was a member of the Servants of India Society and was elected as a fellow of prominent institutions such as the National Academy of Sciences, India, and the Cambridge Philosophical Society at St John's College, Cambridge.

The University was allocated an annual grant of Rs.2.5 lacs by the participating States of Rajputana. The remarkable thing is that the States made it clear that the "acceptance of the grant will in no way detract from the autonomy of the University and its freedom to organise its teaching and administration as to embody in them the highest conception of University life."

Shri C. Rajagopalachari, the first Governor General of free India, had a very clear idea of the importance of the universities and their dignity. Addressing the students of Loyola College, Madras in August 1948, he advocated "we have to maintain the highest standards for our universities. The pressure of democracy may be allowed to bear on anything else, but not on the standard of education."

The foundation stone of the University Campus was laid by Shri C. Rajagopalachari on February 20, 1949. He concluded his address with the words: "Nothing can be achieved unless we learn to be good and correct and self-disciplined and cultivate self-restraint and that, which is called dharma in our beautiful language."

The jurisdiction of this University at that time extended over the entire Rajputana State with the exception of Ajmer-Merwara. In the beginning, it was only an affiliating University with twenty-two colleges in different parts of the state.

The University of Rajasthan has acquired the status of University with Potential for Excellence. Over the years, the University has redefined itself by meeting the challenges of changing trends in the educational system and has made a significant contribution in the field of higher education.



FINANCE AT A GLANCE

Institutional Funds & Optimal Utilization of Resources (Other than salary and fees) The University of Rajasthan (UoR) implements a well-structured strategy for mobilizing funds, ensuring optimal utilization of resources to support academic, research, and infrastructural needs. This approach is anchored in diversified funding avenues, financial planning, and effective management of resources.

Regular Source of Income: Primary sources of revenue generation for UoR include:

- Examination and Course Fees: Substantial income is generated through examination fees and course fees for degree, diploma, and certificate courses and self-financing courses.
- Affiliation Fees from Colleges: Fees from affiliated colleges contribute to the University's financial base.
- Income from Certificates and Revaluation: Income is also derived from issuing migration and provisional certificates, and from the revaluation of answer books.
- Hostel and Non-Teaching Departments: Revenues are generated from hostel services and various non-teaching departments.
- Miscellaneous Receipts: Additional funds come from garden income, sale of forms, recovery and various other sources.
- Government Grants: UoR receives substantial grants from the State Government, along with specific funding from the central government agencies.

Financial Management and Fund Utilization

The financial management system at University of Rajasthan is designed to ensure the efficient and transparent utilization of funds. The Finance Committee, led by the Vice-Chancellor, plays a crucial role in examining budget estimates, reviewing accounts, and advising on financial matters. The University follows a rigorous budgeting process, where a committee of senior faculty prepares budget estimates based on departmental needs. The Finance Committee scrutinizes these estimates, ensuring they align with the University's strategic objectives.

University of Rajasthan adheres to a detailed accounts manual that outlines rules for expenditure, ensuring transparency and efficiency. Funds are allocated to various heads, including salaries, examination expenses, maintenance, and research grants, all monitored through a centralized system to prevent overspending.

Through a strategic approach to fund mobilization and resource management, UoR continues to support its mission of academic excellence, research innovation, and infrastructural development.

The Institution regularly conducts internal and external financial audits

The University of Rajasthan has a robust financial auditing system in place to ensure transparency, accountability, and compliance with financial regulations. The university conducts both internal and external audits to maintain accurate financial records and ensure proper utilization of resources across its operations.

The budget of the University is prepared in accordance with the provisions outlined in Volume 3, Chapter 48, Ordinance 385 and 385A, with audits conducted under various heads, including the maintenance budget, income and expenditure of constituent colleges, specific activities, and accounts related to sponsored projects sanctioned by funding agencies like UGC, MHRD, SAP, DST, and ICSSR.

The internal audit system at the university is overseen by an Audit Cell, comprised of permanently deputed accounts service employees from the Government of Rajasthan. This cell ensures that the financial processes across constituent colleges and departments comply with regulatory guidelines and that any discrepancies are promptly addressed. A separate cell also ensures compliance with audit reports from the Accountant General (AG) and the Local Fund Audit Department (LFAD).

Several types of audits are conducted at the University of Rajasthan to ensure that financial transactions are transparent and properly documented:

- 1. CA Audit: A team of chartered accountants is hired to conduct internal audits, prepare annual accounts, and file GST and income tax returns.
- 2. Internal Audit: A team of auditors deputed by the state government under the supervision of the university's Financial Advisor conducts audits of all university units. This team reviews all financial transactions to ensure compliance and accuracy.
- **3.** AG Audit: The audit team from the Accountant General's office visits the university annually to audit its financial accounts and other related matters.
- **4.** LFAD Audit: The Local Fund Audit Department, Government of Rajasthan, conducts an annual audit of the financial accounts of the university's colleges and departments.

Additionally, the university has a strong external audit mechanism. Each payment is subject to pre-audit by a resident government auditor, ensuring that no payment is processed without prior verification. The utilization certificates for grants received from various funding agencies are certified by an authorized audit officer. Any objections raised during the audit are addressed before payments are finalized, ensuring timely resolution of financial discrepancies.

To resolve audit objections, the university has a mechanism in place where the concerned units provide the necessary documents and explanations to settle any discrepancies. Regular communication between the departments and the audit teams ensures that audit reports are promptly addressed and any issues are rectified in compliance with regulations.

Overall, the University of Rajasthan's audit process involves multiple layers of checks and balances, including internal audits by government-deputed auditors, external audits by AG and LFAD teams, and pre-audit processes to ensure transparency. This comprehensive auditing system ensures that all financial transactions are thoroughly reviewed, compliant with regulations, and properly documented, fostering financial accountability and integrity within the university.

Its annual income ranges from 6 to 8 lakh rupees, reflecting its role as a major player in the local plant market. By offering a wide array of plants at competitive prices, the nursery maintains an extensive and cost-effective inventory, making it an attractive destination for plant buyers and enthusiasts.

One of the highlights of the nursery's annual calendar is its prestigious chrysanthemum exhibition. This highly anticipated event, held once a year, garners considerable attention from the community and beyond. It is graced by distinguished guests, including the Governor, Ministers, and the Vice Chancellor, who often serve as the chief guest. The exhibition showcases the nursery's commitment to horticultural excellence and its role in promoting plant cultivation and appreciation within the campus, enhancing its reputation as a hub of botanical innovation and community engagement.

Mehta has been the V.C. of Kota Open University, JNVU, Jodhpur and Delhi University. Prof. K.L. Kamal had been the V.C. of the University of Rajasthan. Prof. Naresh Dadhich was the V.C. of Vardhman Mahaveer Open University, Kota for two terms (2006-2013). Prof. B.M. Sharma was the V.C. of Kota University and the Chairperson of the Rajasthan Public Service Commission. Prof. Roop Singh Bareth was the V.C. of M.D.S. University, Ajmer.

A new Course on Contemporary Political Theory was also introduced. Three MoUs are signed with DAE (Department of Atomic Energy, Govt. of India); RI-IHS, Birla Institute of Scientific Research (BISR) and Awadh University.

ENGAGING CENTRES

UNIVERSITY INNOVATION CLUSTER IN BIO-TECHNOLOGY (UIC-B) E-YUVA

The E-YUVA (Encouraging Youth for Undertaking Value-Added Innovative Translational Research) Scheme, funded by the Biotechnology Industrial Research Assistance Council (BIRAC), aims to foster a culture of applied research and need-oriented (societal or industry) entrepreneurial innovation among young students and researchers. The scheme is implemented through the E-YUVA Centre (EYC) at the University of Rajasthan, which promotes an entrepreneurial culture through fellowship, annual research grants, pre-incubation support, and mentoring. EYC, located within the University campus and mentored by the BIRAC BioNEST supported TIDES Business Incubator of IIT Roorkee, provides support for students under two categories.

DESIGN INNOVATION CENTRES

Under the National Initiative for setting up Design Innovation Centres, approved by the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India, the Design Innovation Centre (DIC) has been established at the Centre for Converging Technologies, University of Rajasthan, Jaipur. The DIC is supported by three partner institutions: Birla Institute of Scientific Research, Jaipur; RK Patni Government College, Kishangarh; and Lachoo Memorial College of Science and Technology, Jodhpur.

This initiative aims to foster participation, interaction, and collaboration between academia and industry in design innovation, with a focus on converging technologies. The goal is to develop a dynamic curriculum for process, product, and system design that aligns with both industry needs and societal demands.

The key objectives of the DIC are to promote design education, foster a culture of design thinking, and encourage student innovation. It seeks to integrate various resources to create a platform for university-industry partnerships, thereby forming a design innovation network that nurtures pioneering ideas and converts them into commercially viable projects. The training programs offered by the DIC include Food Design, Computer-Aided Drug Design (CADD) in association with Birla Scientific Industrial Research (BISR), Inclusive Development in Materials Science, Clinical Medical Informatics in collaboration with SMS Medical College and BISR, Instrumentation Techniques in Science and Technology, and Intellectual Property Rights/Patents, among others.

USIC: UNIVERSITY SCIENCE INSTRUMENTATION CENTRE

The University Science Instrumentation Centre (USIC) at the University of Rajasthan, established in the late 1970s with initial support from the University Grants Commission (UGC), plays a crucial role in academic and industrial research by providing advanced instrumentation facilities. The Centre's primary objectives are to house high-end research instruments and offer specialized instrumentation services for spectral, thermal, chemical, and microstructural analysis. It supports internal and external researchers, including faculty, scholars, and students, with critical tools for scientific research.

The USIC is equipped with sophisticated instruments such as SQUID, SEM, TEM, GC Mass spectrometer, LC Mass spectrometer, and FTIR spectrometer. These instruments cater to the needs of University Science Departments and other institutions for research in areas like cancer research, virology, nanotechnology, and biotechnology. They are also available for future use by industry.

The Centre is dedicated to enhancing the quality of scientific publications and promoting experimental research. Its thrust areas include nanomaterial characterization and the magnetization of Nano and bulk materials. USIC's infrastructure features major research facilities.

Vision

Scientific instruments may be usefully regarded as the capital goods of scientific research. That is to say, the conduct of scientific research generally requires some antecedent investment in specific equipment to enhance the ability to observe and measure specific categories of natural phenomena. In due course of time, UOR-USIC may play its role in enhancing quality publications and also encourage more people to go for experimental research for practical applications.

1. CENTRE FOR JAIN STUDIES

On the auspicious occasion of Lord Mahaveer's 2500th Nirvana Mahotsava, the Centre for Jain Studies was established in 1974 and a Chair was founded for promoting research work in Jainism. The Centre has a missionary zeal to sponsor and promote research in Jain Studies and other aspects of Comparative Religions and Culture.

At the time of the establishment of the Centre the University had taken a decision that Jainology be treated more as an area of research and the main purpose for establishing the chair should be to encourage the study of Jain religion and ethics in the related departments i.e. Sanskrit, Hindi, Philosophy, Psychology, Sociology, Political Science, Public Administration and History, already existing in the University, and conduct and direct research in the field of Jainology.

To attract the diversified Jainological studies the University also accommodated the study of source material, ideas, thoughts, literature and history of Jainism to be studied as special papers in the regular courses of the Department of the Sanskrit, Philosophy and History with the co-operation and guidance of the person occupying the chair in Jainology. In view of this decision the PG classes in Jain Studies are being taken with PG departments of History, Sanskrit and Philosophy of the University and the faculty of the Centre has been associated with them ever since the establishment of the Centre.

4. CENTRE FOR COMPUTER SCIENCE & INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

The Centre for Computer Science & Information Technology was established in the year 1986, offering initially certificate courses in Computer Science and Instrumentation. The Centre introduced a three-year MCA course in 1990. It shifted to its own building in 1996 and the Centre merged with USIC with the name Institute of Informatics in the year 2002 and the same course. The Centre is renamed University Centre for Computer Science & Information Technology (UCCS & IT) in the year 2007. The Centre has earned the stature of one of the most exciting and innovative Centre in the field of Computer Science and Information Technology in the state of Rajasthan. The students of the Centre participate in seminars and interact with various industry experts. A good number of students of MCA and M.Sc. (IT) have made a mark in different walks of life e.g. Government Sectors, Research, Teaching, Civil Services, Defense, MNCs, etc. The Department provides a learning-friendly environment enabling students to meet global requirements. The Centre for the Development of Physics Education (CDPE), established in May 1978 by the University Grants Commission, has consistently advanced physics education through innovative methods and resources. Originating from the successful University Leadership Programme (1971-78), CDPE focuses on developing new physics experiments and literature, assisting institutions through contact programs, and fabricating and supplying equipment on a no-profit, no-loss basis. The Centre's contributions include over 100 developed experiments and the provision of equipment to universities and institutions both within India and abroad. Notably, these resources are used in ICTP-sponsored training programs at institutions like the University of Dar-es-Salaam, the University of Maiduguri, and the University of Zimbabwe. The Centre's Coupled Oscillator even won the First Prize at an international competition. Committed to fostering educational excellence, CDPE supports research in the Physics Department, enhances IT infrastructure for academic reforms, and organizes workshops and training programs for educators and students through the INSPIRE Programme of DST, Government of India. Its mission is to revolutionize physics education by creating engaging, accessible, and impactful learning experiences, with a vision to empower educators and inspire students to explore the wonders of the physical universe.

6. CENTRE FOR NON-CONVENTIONAL ENERGY RESOURCES

A reliable supply of energy is a key issue of this century. With the aim to achieve this need of human life, the Centre for Non-Conventional Energy Resources (CNCER) was established in the year 2000. The aim of the Centre is to work for Green energy/power. This Centre is mainly established for the purpose of research in the field of renewable energy and material science. This course deals with the issues of alternative energy sources and sustainable development such as Thin films (surface & Interfaces), Solar Cells, Hydrogen Storage (Content measurements & kinematics), Nanostructure & Nano materials synthesis & their characterization for various applications. During the course, the research students are learning

and measuring (hands-on practice) the data through live experiments at the Centre or National/International Collaborative Institutions. The experiments included in the laboratories are based on the theoretical course structure and the research students are allowed to enrich their subject knowledge by independently exploring these experiments for various applications under the supervision of teachers. The thrust areas include Hydrogen Energy: Storage and Applications, Solar Energy: Materials and Devices, Thin Films: Surfaces and Interfaces, and Amorphous Semiconductors.

7. INDIRA GANDHI CENTRE FOR HUMAN ECOLOGY, ENVIRONMENTAL AND POPULATION STUDIES

The Indira Gandhi Centre for Human Ecology, Environmental, and Population Studies was established in 1984. In 1997, the Centre was granted the status of a Department at the University of Rajasthan, Jaipur. Under the COSIST programme, with financial and other support from the UGC, the Department introduced a two-year Master's degree course (M.Sc.) in Environmental Science in July 1997. Additionally, one-year P.G. Diploma courses in Human Ecology, Environmental Studies, and Population Studies were introduced in 1984-85. The department aims to train future generations to address environmental issues sustainably, with a focus on practical, society-driven research. Learning is enhanced through field trips, seminars, and hands-on lab work, and regular activities are conducted to promote environmental awareness. Key areas of focus include waste management, water quality issues, biodiversity conservation, industrial waste impacts, textile wastewater, heavy metal effects, nanoparticle applications, bioremediation, organic farming, desertification, air pollution, and soil carbon estimation. The department's graduates work in environmental consultancies, state and central pollution control boards, industries, as well as in schools and colleges as Environmental Science teachers.

8. CENTRE FOR NUTRITION SCIENCES

9. CENTRE FOR DR. AMBEDKAR STUDIES

The University Grants Commission, New Delhi has set up the Dr. Ambedkar Studies Centre at the University of Rajasthan, Jaipur under the 10th Five Year Plan, in the scheme of Epoch-Making Social Thinkers. The Centre started functioning in March 2008. The main objective of the Centre is to study Bharat Ratna Dr. Ambedkar's thoughts and mission. Baba Saheb's vision has enriched entire humanity for peaceful co-existence and a non-violent society. He emphasized the empowerment of the marginalized and to free them from exploitation and injustice. To further these ideals, Dr. Ambedkar Studies Centre undertakes several activities annually like the 14th April Birth Anniversary, 26th November Law Day, and 6th December "Parinirvan Diwas", and organizes seminars and lectures.

Mehta, eminent political theorist and former Vice-Chancellor, of Delhi University was the founder and Director of the Centre.

11. CENTRE FOR MUSEOLOGY & CONSERVATION

Centre for Museology & Conservation, University of Rajasthan, Jaipur (CMC-UOR) was established in 2006 with a view to promote studies on museology and generate awareness about the conservation of museum objects. Museology as a discipline explores the history and management of museums and their role in society, as well as the activities they engage in, including curating, preservation, public programming, and education. New perspectives of museology are emerging as a way to revitalize the educational role of museums. Centre for Museology & Conservation, University of Rajasthan, Jaipur runs an innovatively designed post-graduate course - M.A. in Museology and Conservation, a four-semester course with a duration of

two years. The Centre is the first of its kind in Rajasthan to have a conservation laboratory of its own and awards a degree in both museology and conservation. The Centre has witnessed a remarkable growth during the last decade. It has organized a series of lectures, workshops, and seminars by inviting renowned experts from India and abroad. The Centre has also brought out some important publications and has worked in collaboration with external bodies like INTACH, ASI, IGNCA, NMI, and University of Leicester, UK. The Centre also possesses a library.

A. INFONET CENTRE

The Infonet Centre at the University of Rajasthan is the technical backbone, managing the Campus Wide Area Network, Wi-Fi Network, website maintenance, mail servers, result servers, and research servers. It plays a crucial role in providing access to digital resources and advancing the university's technology infrastructure using open-source software and the Linux-Apache-MySQL/Perl/PHP (LAMP) platform. The Centre collaborates with the Campus Wide Area Network (CWAN), known as RUN (Rajasthan University Network), which uses Gigabit Ethernet Technology with Optical Fiber Backbone for high-speed connectivity across the campus, and the National Knowledge Network (NKN), which offers ultra-high-speed internet to institutions across India. The Centre ensures compliance with NKN policies to support advanced studies and research. Its goal is to enhance academic excellence and facilitate knowledge dissemination, aiming for seamless access to resources and enriched academic experiences. Best practices include in-house web application development and maintenance, continuous improvement of applications, and securing services with SSL and TLS encryption. The Centre's infrastructure features Blade Servers and SAN solutions for data management, modern networking with RUN and NKN, and facilities for academic functions like video conferencing.

University Web Servers

One of the core features of Infonet Centre's services is that all of its websites are SSL and TLS enabled. SSL stands for Secure Sockets Layer, while TLS stands for Transport Layer Security. Both protocols are used to encrypt data that is transmitted over the internet, providing an extra layer of security against hackers and other cyber threats. SSL and TLS are widely used across the internet, and they have become the de facto standard for securing web traffic. Infonet Centre's SSL and TLS-enabled websites ensure that all data transmitted between the user and the server is encrypted, providing a secure connection that is resistant to eavesdropping and tampering. Hostels and Wardens

The University of Rajasthan and its constituent colleges offer well-equipped hostel accommodation. There are 19 hostels in total, with 14 on the main campus and the rest at constituent colleges. Hostels are designated for specific courses or streams, each with its unique tradition and culture. Hostel life fosters a blend of diverse cultures, contributing to a rich and memorable experience. The university emphasizes cleanliness, discipline, and a supportive environment. Annual youth festivals are organized in each hostel, and an inter-hostel youth festival, "Basant," provides a competitive platform for showcasing cultural talents. Students admitted to University departments and colleges are eligible for hostel accommodation, though those with failed or pending examinations may not be eligible for admission or readmission. Hostel admission is based on merit and availability, and forms must be submitted online and in hard copy, signed by the HOD/Principal. Self-Financing Scheme (SFS) students are considered for girls' hostels if seats are available.

C. National Service Scheme

Launched on September 24, 1969, by Union Education Minister Dr. V.K.R.V. Rao, the National Service Scheme (NSS) began in 37 universities across India. The University Health Centre provides comprehensive medical services with facilities for allopathic, Ayurveda, and homeopathic treatments. Essential medicines are provided free of charge. The centre organizes routine and specialized health check-ups, including tests for blood pressure, blood sugar, bone mass density, pulmonary function, thyroid function, lipid profile, neuropathy, and urological conditions. It offers curative, preventive, comprehensive, rehabilitative, and nutritional services, as well as psychological counseling for students, faculty, employees, and their dependents. The campus also has a Post Office, Banks: ICICI Bank, UCO Bank, Book Store, Beauty Wellness, Canteen/ Cafeteria, Swinning Zone

CENTRAL FACILITIES

A. CENTRAL LIBRARY

The Central Library building is located near the main gate of the University. It has a seating capacity of about 700 students. It has collection of more than 5 lac books, bound periodicals, etc. The Library subscribes to a plethora of current journals in physical form relating to various subjects. In addition, about 10500+e-journals are available for online access under e-Shodh Sindhu Consortium. RFID system has been installed for in house operations of the Central Library. Anew building of the University Central Library has been constructed with a financial assistance of nearly 12 crore rupees from UGC under UPE grant. This building will be soon made operational. The Rajasthan University Library's goal and vision include expanding services based on e-resources and Web-OPAC services. The library boasts a rich collection of old documents known as 'The Abu Collection', which includes Government reports, gazetteers, and other publications dating back to the early 19th Century, valuable for historians. The Abu Collection is now available in digitized format in the National Digital Library. The Library also maintains a notable Micro-form Collection, featuring microfilms and microfiches.

The Library operates every day of the year, except for the following holidays: 26th January (Republic Day), 15th August (Independence Day), Dhulandi, Dussehra, Govardhan Pooja (the day after Deepawali), and on special occasions by order of the Director.

Book Circulation through RFID

Book borrowing facility is available to all faculty, research scholars, students and University staff. RFID technology is used for book's security and RFID Smart Cards are issued to Central Library members for automated circulation. Only general books will be issued, but reference books, rare books, theses & dissertations, loose/bound issues of periodicals and such other reference materials are only for consultation within the Central library. Borrowers must satisfy themselves about the physical condition of the books before borrowing otherwise, they

will be held responsible for any damage or mutilation noticed later or at the time of returning. Circulation staff in the Central library will also assist you in locating items in the stack area and related matters.

Book Bank Facility

The library has a rich collection of old documents including the collection of British resident at Mount Abu, which is popularly known as 'The Abu collection'. This includes Government reports, gazetteers and other publications dating back to early 19" Century. These are of research value for Historians, Economists and Sociologists.

Central Library offers Inter Library Loan Service for the documents that are not available in Central Library collection. This service is provided to entire University community to meet their academic and research needs.

B. ENGINEERING & WORKS DEPARTMENT

- 4. Withholding of any document
- 5. Demand of money in excess of that specified to be charged
- 6. Reservation of seats in admission to different categories of students
- 7. Non-payment or delay in payment of Scholarships or financial aid
- 8. Delay by the institution in the conduct of examinations, or declaration of results
- 9. Failure by the institution to provide student amenities as set out in the prospectus
- Non-transparent or unfair practices adopted by the institution for the evaluation of students.
- 11. Delay in, or denial of, the refund of fees due to a student who withdraws admission within the time mentioned in the prospectus
- 12. Complaints of alleged discrimination of students from the Scheduled Castes, the Scheduled Tribes, Other Backward Classes, Women, Minorities, or persons with disabilities categories.
- 13. Denial of quality education as promised at the time of admission.

F. College Development Council (CDC)

The Collage Development Council (CDC) was established by the University in 1978 under the UGC scheme to ensure proper planning and development of its affiliated and constituent Colleges (Govt., Non-Govt., and Constituent), improve higher education standards, and enhance faculty quality. The CDC invites proposals from Colleges under sections 2(f) and 12-B of the UGC Act, 1956, and recommends them to the UGC for approval. Currently, 108 Colleges affiliated with the University of Rajasthan, Jaipur are recognized by the UGC under section 2(f) & 12-B, and 36 Colleges under section 2(f). Among these, 04 Colleges have CPE status and 02 have Autonomous Status. UGC Schemes for College Teachers include Faculty Improvement Programmes, Major/Minor Research Projects, and UGC Schemes for Students such as Conferences/Workshops/ Seminars, Travel Grants, and Day Care Centers. UGC provides financial assistance for various schemes, including Development for Colleges, Coaching for NET for SC/ST/OBC (non-creamy layer) & Minorities, construction/renovation of Academic buildings, purchase of Books & Journals, Equipment, Colleges with Potential for Excellence (CPE), Women Hostels, Golden Jubilee/Centenary grants, Additional Grants, Infrastructure Rejuvenation, 'Catch-up' grants, and support for Colleges in Rural/Remote/ Border/Hill/Tribal Areas, and Backward Areas. The Coordinator, CDC assists Colleges with proposals and guidance, monitors UGC grant utilization, and recommends proposals to the UGC based on the guidelines on www.ugc.ac.in. The CDC plays a key role in improving infrastructure and benefiting faculty and students.

G. International Coorperation Cell

International Cooperation Cell established in 2007, works to facilitate cooperation between University of Rajasthan and International universities. It coordinates, negotiates and partners with International Universities to develop exchange programmes for faculty and students. From 2007 onwards, 54 mobilities of students and Faculty have taken place. Out of these, 19 students and 08 faculty members have come from foreign Universities to the University of Rajasthan and 25 students and 02 Faculty members have gone from University of Rajasthan to Paul Valery Montpellier-III, Jean Moulin Lyon-III, University of Montreal, Quebec, Canada, and Novosibirsk State Technical University. Currently 2 students from ELLCS department are pursuing their one semester as exchange student in Jean Moulin Lyon 3. Two students from Jean Moulin Lyon 3 have applied to UOR to come for 2 semesters. 1 student from ELLCS Department, University of Rajasthan has applied to study for one semester to France in 2019-2020. MOUs with the University JeanMoulin Lyon 3, France and the University Laval (Quebec, Canada) were renewed in 2019 for 5 years.

OTHERS

A. INSTITUTIONAL PERFORMANCE APPRAISAL SYSTEM & WELFARE MEASURES

The University of Rajasthan (UoR) prioritizes the professional growth and well-being of both teaching and non-teaching staff, fostering a supportive and enabling environment.

Performance Appraisal and Career Development: UoR adheres to UGC regulations and the CAS framework for faculty performance appraisal and career progression. A Performance-Based Appraisal System (PBAS) is actively solicited for faculty performance evaluation and academic progression.

Avenues for Professional Growth: UoR's IQAC and HRDC regularly organize faculty development programs, skill-enhancing courses, and workshops that foster continuous learning, promote research excellence, and encourage collaboration across departments. UoR provides financial assistance to faculty members for participation in national and international seminars and conferences, membership fees of professional bodies and the purchases of books, fostering continuous learning and research excellence.

Performance Management for Staff: Transparent Appraisal System: A transparent and well-defined Annual Confidential Report (ACR) system evaluates the performance of non-teaching staff. Promotions are conducted by duly constituted committees following the University's established rules and regulations. A standard mechanism committee also addresses grievances lodged by staff members, ensuring a fair and transparent process.

Comprehensive Staff Welfare Measures

Healthcare: UoR prioritizes the well-being of its staff by offering medical care through established Centers for Allopathic, Ayurvedic and Homeopathic treatment. These facilities cater to the needs of teaching and non-teaching staff, their dependents and students. Free medicines, regular check-ups, health camps, health awareness lectures and yoga sessions promote preventive healthcare measures.

Sports and Recreation: UoR fosters a healthy lifestyle by providing access to on-campus sports facilities like a swimming pool, a multipurpose gym, playgrounds, and courts for various games. These facilities encourage physical activity and promote staff well-being.

Employee-Friendly Policies: UoR offers a range of employee-friendly policies and benefits, including medical reimbursements, comprehensive health insurance for staff and their family members, advances/loans, and leave benefits (including childcare leave), as per standard

UNIVERSITY PRESS

The University Press is a small unit registered under the Factory Act Established on 1962, November 1st. The press conducts various types of printing works allotted to it. The press possesses one mechanical composing unit, one offset printing machine, two automatic printing machines, three machines and one cylinder machine. Most of the work done in the Press is related either to the academic side or to the examination. For the Examination branch, it prints Application Forms, Examination Programmes, Marks-sheets, Roll Lists, Tabulation Registers, Headings and various other types of forms related to it. Printing of English versions of the degrees in all faculties is also done by the Press. The Press prints and supplies about 75 types of printed stationary items. These are stored in the Press and supplied to various departments and constituent colleges of the University during the whole year. These items include various types of Registers, Forms, Receipts Books, File Covers, and File Boards, etc. The Press also caters to the need for various forms required towards affiliation of colleges. It also executes the Printing of Journals of the University South Asia Study Centre, Mass Communication, Department of ABST, Business administration, EAFM, S.S.R.C. Economics, Magazines like Glimpses, Booklet of various conferences organized by the departments, Reference Books for the Centre for Mass Communication, etc. Successful efforts have been made during the past 53 years to increase the income of revenue and curtailment of expenditures. There has been no labour trouble and the employer-employee relationship has remained cordial throughout the period under report.
